LOCAL & GLOBAL OUTREACH 2024 LENTEN PROJECT

During Lent, Local & Global Outreach is coordinating a hands-on project for our congregation on behalf of Lutheran World Relief (LWR). They are holding a drive to supply Personal Care Kits, one of their most requested items, to those in need. You are invited to share your LOVE (EVOL) with our neighbors around the world.

Starting **TODAY** (2/18), we will ask for their suggested items during these Lenten five weeks in order to make as many complete kits as we can at wrap-up. There will be a donation box in the Gathering Area where you may donate each week or all at once if that's easier for you. The following items, weeks 1-5, make one complete kit.

- Week 1 Today (2/18): One new light-weight (not fluffy as thin dry quicker in the sun), dark-colored towel (between 20"x40" and 27"x52").
- Week 2 Sunday, Feb. 25: Two or three bath-sized bars of soap (in original wrapping).
- Week 3 Sunday, Mar. 3: One adult toothbrush (in original packaging).
- Week 4 Sunday, Mar. 10: One sturdy comb (remove packaging).
- Week 5 Sunday, Mar. 17: One metal nail clippers (remove packaging).

LWR is asking for these new, undecorated items specifically as they want to ensure that all the kits are identical for all.

Flowers may be picked up Easter Sunday after the 11:00 am service. **Sign up deadline is Sunday, March 17** (*no additional flowers will be ordered after that date*).

HOLY WEEK

The Triduum (The Three Days) is the ancient observance of the mystery of our salvation, which plunges the faithful into the death of Jesus and brings them with him to resurrection life. The Three Days is one liturgy, extending from Thursday evening through the Easter Vigil. You are invited to conform your life to the worship rhythms of the church on these three days:

Palm Sunday, March 24, 8:30 am and 11:00 am

Palm Sunday is focused on Jesus' willingness to upset the status quo of the empire's kingdom, and subvert the powers and principalities with a new revolution. This r(evol)ution of love transforms the world!

Maundy Thursday, March 28, 7:00 pm

We heed Christ's commandment to love one another as we wash each other's feet and share the meal he instituted.

Good Friday, March 29, Ecumenical Walk, 12 noon and Worship, 7:00 pm

Annual Harrisonburg downtown ecumenical prayer walk, 12 noon – 1:00 pm. We hear the passion of Christ from the Shenandoah Valley Biblical Storytellers, the narrative of Jesus crucified and reigning from the cross.

Easter Vigil, Saturday, March 30, 8:00 pm

This is the high point of the church's year, the night, the very night, the Passover of Christ from death to life. This year's Vigil will be a simplified version of the traditional liturgy. We'll begin with the lighting of the new fire, and process into the sanctuary for the reading of the Word. 16 readers will share with us the entirety of the Gospel of Mark, for a truly epic experience of the Gospel story. We'll then gather around the communion table to celebrate the first resurrection meal. Following the service, we'll extend the celebration of Easter with food and fellowship.

Easter Sunday, March 31, 8:30 am and 11:00 am

The ultimate r(evol)ution of love came about through the death and resurrection of Jesus. Christ is risen, and through him all creation is made new! On Easter Sunday, in word and feast, we celebrate God's unending love.

Join us for our annual **Easter Egg Hunt** inside the MAC at 9:45. In addition to the hunt there will be an opportunity to have a family picture taken and printed, games, and activities for kids of all ages.



VIRGINIA INTERFAITH CENTER FOR PUBLIC POLICY MEETING



On January 17, Ramona Sanders and Laura Douglass attended the 2024 *Day for All People* and shared this report...

We gathered for discussion and advocacy on behalf of Virginia's people, its institutions and the environment. We came as people from many traditions: Humanist, Jew, Christian, Muslim, Bahai, Buddhist, Hindu and Sikh. We advocated for people on the margins of our community, on issues like living wages, access to paid sick days, affordable housing, unconscious bias training, and incarceration, as well as other issues of social and environmental justice. Some legislators agreed with us; others may not have. We shared from our hearts what we believe is best for our brothers and sisters and for the Commonwealth. We prayed for all our legislators and thanked them for their service with thank you notes. As we return home to our houses of worship, schools, and communities, we pledge to encourage others to join our efforts in continuing our advocacy. We realize that our work is not finished. The work of changing hearts and minds never ends, and it will always be the right time to do the right thing. We realize that the issues on which we are working may not be resolved this this legislative session; still, we know that our work here matters. May our words and work reflect the highest aspirations of our faiths and resonate in the hearts of our legislators who we met, that they may pass good and just laws for all Virginians.

From <u>What Should We Expect When We Read</u> <u>the Bible?</u> by Dr. Darrell Jodock:

We should also not expect to have every question about God answered. For Luther, God remains hidden even as God's will for us is revealed. What God has revealed to us in Jesus the Christ is surprising enough and troubling enough so that we need to be cautious about our expectations. From the Bible we learn about God's grace and mercy and God's will for a restored world, but we do not have all our questions answered. Even with Christ and even with the Bible, we still see through a glass dimly (see 1 Cor. 13:12).
