### WELCOME GUEST PREACHER

## HISTORY ON DISPLAY

Last week our exhibit featured relics and photos from Muhlenberg through its first 100 years, up through 1949, the last year the congregation occupied the brick building on North Main Street (for those who remember, it was the previous location for the Glen's Fair Price Store). Today, we have a window from the old church on display! Special thanks to Richard Early who lent us the window for display this morning.

In the 1940's during World War II, the congregation continued to grow and began planning for a new building. Additional property was purchased on East Market Street adjacent to the parsonage at the time. During the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the congregation, on June 26, 1949, ground was broken for the current church building.

The new church building was designed as a Neo-Gothic structure, with a narrow nave and a high ceiling. This shape provides a space where music is lively because it can reverberate for an extended period before dying out. However, as part of a national post-war trend, the church was also designed to have acoustics more like a home living room with acoustical ceiling tiles and carpet to dampen the sound. Both of those finishes have been replaced.

The building was designed with pipe chambers on each side of the chancel with the intent of installing a pipe organ. But with limited funds and rising costs, the congregation was not able to complete the church as planned. Instead, plans were made to "phase" the construction. The first phase consisted of the construction of the basement. Worship services were held there while the sanctuary was built above. The first two units were dedicated in 1952.

The sanctuary did not originally contain a pipe organ or stained-glass windows. They were to be added later when they could be afforded.

In 1956 a new parsonage was purchased on Dixie Avenue, and in 1958 construction of the education wing of the church was begun. It was completed in 1960.

During the 1960's, East Market Street was widened, eliminating much of the parking for the church. Additional property was purchased behind the church for parking. A lot that was purchased on East Water Street included a duplex that was used by the church as an annex for Christian education and Boy Scouts. It was named "The Dovel Building." During the 1970's funds were raised and six stained-glass windows were installed in the sanctuary.

By 1985, the church debt was retired and plans were begun to install a pipe organ to complete the design of the new worship space. A committee was formed and a capital campaign was introduced to the congregation for a new pipe organ. A contract was awarded to the M. P. Möller company. The current pipe organ was installed and dedicated in 1991.

Today's exhibit features photos, news articles and programs from the ground breaking, through the construction and dedication of the current church building.

Mark Byerly will be available to answer questions about the display between services today. We give thanks to the 175<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Committee for all their work to provide historic information throughout the year.

Since the Wednesday Why Group meets here at the church immediately before choir rehearsal, it was convenient to also attend that Why Group as well. Maybe I shouldn't have been surprised, but even though we were exploring the same scripture passage through the very same study questions, the Wednesday group raised a few completely different perspectives. It was like getting an enhanced "3-D" view of the topic.

## HOLY WEEK

#### Palm Sunday, March 24, 8:30 am and 11:00 am

Palm Sunday is focused on Jesus' willingness to upset the status quo of the empire's kingdom, and subvert the powers and principalities with a new revolution. This r(evol)ution of love transforms the world!

The Triduum (The Three Days) is the ancient observance of the mystery of our salvation, which plunges the faithful into the death of Jesus and brings them with him to resurrection life. The Three Days is one liturgy, extending from Thursday evening through the Easter Vigil. You are invited to conform your life to the worship rhythms of the church on these three days:

### Maundy Thursday, March 28, 7:00 pm

We heed Christ's commandment to love one another as we wash each other's feet and share the meal he instituted. Pastor Paul Weber (former Muhlenberg Interim Pastor) will be our guest preacher and his wife Florence will be our guest organist. The nursery will be open and staffed.

### Good Friday, March 29, Ecumenical Walk, 12 noon

The 37<sup>th</sup> annual Harrisonburg downtown ecumenical Good Friday prayer walk, based on the "Stations of the Cross," begins at Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church and ends at St. Stephens United Church of Christ, stopping at a total of 10 downtown churches and public buildings. At each station a member of the Biblical Storytellers Guild will tell a passage from the Gospel of Mark and a local pastor responds with a prayer. (Pastor Lauren and a number of Muhlenberg members will be praying/telling.) The walking route is accessible for wheelchairs/strollers.

### Good Friday, March 29, Worship, 7:00 pm

We hear the passion of Christ, the narrative of Jesus crucified and reigning from the cross. The nursery will be open and staffed.

## Easter Vigil, Saturday, March 30, 8:00 pm

This is the high point of the church's year, the night, the very night, the Passover of Christ from death to life. This year's Vigil will be a simplified version of the traditional liturgy. We'll begin with the lighting of the new fire, and process into the sanctuary for the reading of the Word. 16 readers will share with us the entirety of the Gospel of Mark, for a truly epic experience of the Gospel story. We'll then gather around the communion table to celebrate the first resurrection meal. Following the service, we'll extend the celebration of Easter with food and fellowship.

### **UPDATED NOTEBOOKS**

## CHURCH ENTRY SYSTEM Outside Doors Rekeyed!

All outside doors of the church building have been rekeyed. As you may recall, improving our entry security has been completed in phases. Phase 1 was the installation of the keypad itself on one of the east side Gathering Area doors. Phase 2 was to issue PINs to those who routinely need access to the church building so they can gain entry through the keypad.

We completed Phase 3 (our final phase) by rekeying all outside doors to maximize security. **"BCK" and all previous keys that unlocked outside doors no longer work.** If you need routine access to the church and have not applied for a PIN, please contact Linda Depoy (depoy@muhlenberglutheran.org or 540-434-3496). Please note this rekeying does not affect the MAC. You will gain access to it the same way you always have.

## Local & Global Outreach

### **2024** LENTEN PROJECT

During Lent, Local & Global Outreach is coordinating a hands-on project for our congregation on behalf of Lutheran World Relief (LWR). They are holding a drive to supply Personal Care Kits, one of LWR's most requested items, to those in need. You are invited to share your LOVE (EVOL) with our neighbors around the world.

We are asking for their suggested items during these Lenten five weeks in order to make as many complete kits as we can at wrap-up. There is a donation box in the Gathering Area where you may donate each week or all at once if that's easier for you. The following items, weeks 1 -5, make one complete kit.

- Week 1 Sunday, Feb.18: One new light-weight (not fluffy as thin dry quicker in the sun), dark-colored towel (between 20"x40" and 27"x52").
- Week 2 Sunday, Feb. 25: Two or three bath-sized bars of soap (in original wrapping).
- Week 3 Sunday, March 3: One adult tooth-brush (in original packaging).
- Week 4 Today (3/10): One sturdy comb (remove packaging).
- Week 5 Sunday, Mar. 17: One metal nail clippers (remove packaging).

LWR is asking for these new, undecorated items specifically as they want to ensure that all the kits are identical for all.

## **CONFIRMATION CORNER**

Confirmation isn't just for middle schoolers! All the baptized who have been confirmed are called to grow in faith and affirm God's promises in their life. You can support the hard work of our middle school students by reflecting on these Confirmation Corner thoughts each week. Here's a confirmation prompt for this week from <u>What Should We Expect When We Read</u> <u>the Bible?</u> by Dr. Darrell Jodock:

We should expect that each book of the Bible was written for a particular purpose and has a particular message. Though the overall message of the Bible is consistent, we can read each book to try to discover questions such as: When was it written? By whom? To whom? For what purpose? For example, it would be good if we could say to ourselves on a Sunday morning when the Gospel is read-oh, yes, that's from Luke--and here's what is distinctive about Luke's Gospel. Or, when Jeremiah is read--oh, yes, this is what was going on in Jeremiah's day. What were his primary concerns, and how does this passage express those concerns? When we discover the purpose and message of the book in the context of when it was originally written, we are better able to discover the message it holds for today, and for the future. What is meant provides a kind of anchor for our interpretation of what it means now.
