COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

At Monday's meeting Congregation Council...

- Celebrated being certified as "GOLD" level from the Harrisonburg-Rockingham Living Wage Campaign - certifying that all employees make at least \$15/hour. (We join 4 other local congregations who have attained this certification). *See page 6 for details*.
- Celebrated that the church van has been sold for \$23,000 to the local after school program, *On the Road Collaborative*. Click <u>HERE</u> for more information about the organization. (The decision to sell the van was made at the November congregational meeting to help meet our aspirational budget). Be sure to thank Trustee Adam Copeland for heading up the van sale.
- Heard a report from the Entrepreneurial Task Force presenting creative ideas on how to best make use of our building and property for living out our mission (and perhaps receiving additional income as well!) Congregation Council approved the team's proposal to further investigate the installation of electric car chargers in the Water Street Parking lot. We will keep the congregation informed as this possibility develops.

• Learned the Property Committee will have a new doorbell/church entry system installed in the near future to provide additional security and access to the building.

FROM PALM SUNDAY TO EASTER

Worship on **Palm Sunday**, **NEXT Sunday**, **April 2**, begins with a procession from the Gathering Area to the Sanctuary to reenact Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and the Blessing of Palms. After glorious and uplifting anthems of praise from the choirs, the tone shifts quickly to the story of Jesus' suffering and death.

Palm Sunday begins the holiest week of the year for Christians as we enter into the story of Jesus' passion. On Thursday, we will commune with him at the Last Supper. On Good Friday we will watch him die on the tree of the cross, and on Saturday at the Easter Vigil, we will celebrate his rising and our rising with him in baptism.

The Great Three Days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday will deepen your faith and your life and make Easter Sunday's worship an even greater gift. Of course, it doesn't stop there. The Easter season stretches on for seven weeks of joyful celebration! *See page 5 for details about Holy Week services and activities*.

Note: On Palm Sunday if you prefer to take a seat in the Sanctuary during the procession, you are welcome to do so.



ABOUT OUR PALMS



Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem was celebrated by using palm branches, according to the Gospel of John. Lutherans around the world recount this story of Jesus, re-enacting the waving of palms on Palm Sunday.

To ensure that palms are harvested in a more environmentally sustainable way whereby harvesters can earn a fair income for their labor, Muhlenberg Lutheran Church is purchasing "eco-palms" for Palm Sunday. As far back as March 16, 2008, Lutheran World Relief has partnered with Chamaedorea Palm Certification Project to build support for ecopalms in the United States. Purchasing ecopalms benefits farmers. families and communities in cooperatives where they are grown. It's a way each of us can walk-thewalk with Jesus on Palm Sunday.

For those worshipping at home, palms will be available in the Connection Box Friday and Saturday, March 31 and April 1. You may pick them up any time those days.

With palm branches in our hands, we sing "Hosanna" to our king, then follow Jesus to the cross. Walter Wangerin, Jr.'s "The Cry of the Whole Congregation" invites us into the drama of Christ.

Maundy Thursday ~ April 6, 7:00 pm *

In this deeply moving service, we reflect on Jesus' final words and actions with his disciples, with individual confession and forgiveness, foot washing, Holy Communion, and the stripping of the altar.

Good Friday ~ April 7, Ecumenical Walk, 12 noon and Worship, 7:00 pm*

Annual Harrisonburg downtown ecumenical prayer walk, 12 noon – 1:00 pm. see page 6.

We continue the journey through the Great Three Days, as we read the passion story from the gospel of Matthew, pray for the whole world for which Christ died, and honor the cross as a sign of forgiveness, healing, and salvation.

ECUMENICAL GOOD FRIDAY PRAYER WALK Friday, April 7, 12 noon – 1:00 pm

The 36th annual Harrisonburg downtown ecumenical Good Friday prayer walk, based on the "Stations of the Cross," will be held Friday, April 7, from 12 noon to 1:00 pm. The walk begins at Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church, and ends at St. Stephens United Church of Christ, stopping at a total of 10 downtown churches and public buildings. Led by someone carrying a large cross, the group stops at each station where a member of the "Biblical Storytellers Guild" (many of whom are Muhlenberg members) will tell a passage from the Gospel of Matthew and a local pastor (one of whom is Pastor Lauren) responds with a prayer. This is a contemplative, communal, and spiritual practice of shared ecumenical worship and witness that has been going on every year in downtown Harrisonburg for 36 years. Please join us! CREATION CARE

Use hydrogen peroxide (HP) instead of bleach when you wash a load of whites. HP is just as effective for whitening your clothes but has none of the harmful environmental effects of bleach. HP is simply water with an extra oxygen molecule. It is produced naturally in the environment when sunlight mixes with water. Add a cup of 3% HP to your wash as an inexpensive and color-safe alternative to bleach; your clothes will look great and you'll be safeguarding marine life.

ADDITIONAL COUNCIL UPDATE: EXTERIOR WORK AT THE CHURCH Part of the fun of having an older building are the surprises that come in its upkeep! In the process of getting bids from painting contractors to repaint our exterior fire escape on the west end of the building, one of the contractors tested the chipping paint and discovered that the base layer tested positive for lead. Because of this, we're going to have to have a more extensive (and expensive!) process for painting than we'd planned. We've hired an EPA Lead Safe Certified contractor to oversee the process, so we can be sure we are doing right everything and preventing any contamination or exposure on our property, especially to the children at the daycare.

Over the coming weeks, you'll see a wooden barrier go up around the stairwell, as well as plastic sheeting that will collect any little bits of paint that come off as they're sanding the stairwell. Soon we'll have a shiny new 3 layers of paint sealing the stairwell and ensuring that we're safe for years to come! The stairwell will be accessible as a fire escape throughout the project, but we ask that folks stay away from the work site except in an emergency.

ENTERING THE CHURCH

Jesus was able to walk through locked doors (see John 20) but entering Muhlenberg's building is sometimes a little harder for those who come to the church on a weekday! For the safety of all who use our space during the week, all doors remain locked at all times. Until our new system is installed, when you arrive at the church, we ask you to call the church's main phone number, located on a sign on the Gathering Area doors, and a staff person will come to open the Gathering Area door for you.

Muhlenberg has been certified as a Harrisonburg-Rockingham Living Wage Certified Employer at the Gold (highest) level! We join 87 other local businesses and

congregations who are committed to paying employees a living wage. The Living Wage Campaign is a project of the Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy, a non-partisan coalition which advocates racial, social, and economic justice in Virginia's policies and practices through education, prayer, and action.

The Local & Global Mission Committee's focus for April is Patchwork Pantry (70 South High Street, Harrisonburg). It is entirely volunteer operated and distributes food and supplies to make sure no one in our community goes hungry. The pantry currently serves 60 - 65 households regularly every Wednesday night. Also, in the past few months they've had more limited choices through free USDA programs.

Each Sunday in April, our committee is asking for specific donations of **ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise, and relish**. The pantry will distribute these items in May to help families be prepared for warm weather meals. These items are occasionally available from Blue Ridge Area Food Bank, but are nearly always in tiny little restaurant packages. Let's see if we can reach the goal of 65 of each condiment!

"THE WHY CROSS"

QUESTIONS ANSWERED

We are highlighting two of your questions this week.

"Why do we take more than we need?"

This is a question that Christians have been wrestling with since the beginning of the church, and it's an important question to ask of others and especially of ourselves often! Jesus speaks a great deal about selfless living, and in his letter to the Romans, Paul writes, "I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate." (Romans 7:15)

Later on, Augustine of Hippo would coin a phrase in Latin that our own Martin Luther would talk about quite a lot: Incurvatus in se. This means "curved or turned inward on oneself."

Why do we take more than we need? Because we often think only of ourselves, rather than the needs of others. Why? Sin causes us to turn inward rather than living outwardly for others.

But through grace received as a gift, and repentance as an act of faithfulness God can turn us outward again. We gather in community often, and I think one of the important things we can remind ourselves and one another about is this simple message: You are enough, We are enough, There is enough.

We are meant to trust in God's abundance that is all around us. But I think we'll keep asking this question forever, and we'll have to keep trusting in God's love and mercy to open our hearts to be selfless, even after we have been selfish. +Pastor Alex

"Why do we doubt, even knowing God is with us?"

This question makes me think of my favorite story in scripture from Matthew 14. The disciples are in a boat together and they get caught up in a storm. Suddenly they see Jesus walking across the water toward them, and they're afraid. But Peter pipes up and says, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." Jesus said, "Come." So Peter incredibly begins to walk on water too. But suddenly he sees the wind and the waves and grows scared. He begins to sink, and cries out "Lord Save Me." Jesus reaches out a hand, catches Peter, and says, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?"

I mean... Peter can see Jesus... Doing something miraculous no less! Why would he doubt?

We often talk about receiving faith as a gift from God for us to steward. But in this story, and so often in our own lives, we take the gift of faith and invest it in the wrong things. Peter had faith enough to walk on water, but then put his faith in the waves and wind to consume him more than he did Jesus. When we doubt, often it's not the lack of faith, but us putting the gift of faith into things like fear, comfort, personal biases, or institutions, rather than putting our faith in the one who called us out on the waters in the first place.

When we doubt—and we will—I pray that we'll have Peter's words springing to our heart, "Lord save me." We are called to put our faith in nothing less than Christ who saves. So have no fear, doubt is a part of faith, and the one who gives faith to us as a gift will be there to catch us whenever we're sinking. +*Pastor Alex*

WORLD DOWN SYNDROME DAY WITH BRANDON STEES

On Tuesday March 21, we shared a reflection by Brandon Stees, helping the Muhlenberg community celebrate one of Brandon's favorite days of the year: World Down Syndrome Day (WDSD)! WDSD happens annually on March 21, and it is a global awareness day which has been officially observed by the United Nations since 2012. The date for WDSD being the 21st day of the 3rd month, was selected to signify the uniqueness of the triplication (trisomy) of the 21st chromosome which causes Down syndrome.

The WDSD theme for 2023 is "With Us Not For Us." So in that spirit, we thought we'd let Brandon himself explain why this day is so important to him and many others around the world.



"[Don't] put people in a box. We want to be more inclusive and have more opportunities. If we put [people with Down Syndrome] in a box, then we just don't know them. Inclusive practices really can shine for many people, especially those with Down Syndrome," Brandon said. "It's very hopeful, I have to say, that God creates us, and makes us unique. We have different talents, [and] for people with a disability, I know it's like a struggle, but at the same time it's beautiful. There are a lot of people who have different strengths and different interests... God makes us each unique!"

We join Brandon and many others today in the work of moving on from the outdated charity model of disability, where people with disability were treated as objects of charity, deserving of pity and relying on others for support. A human rights-based approach views people with disabilities as having the right to be treated fairly and have the same opportunities as everyone else, working WITH others to improve their lives. We give God thanks today for Brandon and all those who represent the beautiful diversity of God's creation. Today and every day let us be sure they are included.
