Here are some ideas for how you can grow in your own generosity:

- 1. Systematic giving leads to generosity: For most people, we can grow significantly in our giving just by making our gift on a regular basis. Sign up for automatic giving by contacting Finance Manager Jane Eanes (eanes@muhlenberglutheran.org/540-434-3496) or just add an amount each week or month. Growing giving by \$1 per day equates to significant growth over the course of the year.
- 2. An extra gift or two during the year: One congregation member said, "I'm not sure what the future holds for me, but for now I am doing okay, so I will double my giving in the month of April." Well, what if we decided to double our giving one month or even two months next year?
- 3. Grow by a percentage each year: For some, the idea of a tithe is unachievable in a single year, but something people would like to reach someday. By growing giving by a percentage each year, it is achievable over the long term. If you currently give away 2% of income, perhaps you can reach 3% next year and 4% the year after. This takes discipline, but over the long term can be very effective!
- 4. An idea for someone whose income has gone down in the last year: Everyone can grow in generosity, even if that means the overall dollars given decreases. Perhaps, if before your income decreased you were giving away 2% of your income, now with income being less, can you find a way to grow the percentage of giving to 3 or 4%.

You may have your own ideas for growing in generosity. For our church family, as we grow in our generosity, it will have a tremendous overall impact. Keeping our ministry strong will enable us to dream about an ever-growing ministry into the future! New life is all around us, and the call to discipleship in this life is one of living generously and joyfully in response to all God has done for us. In continued Easter joy, may our intentionality today mark a new beginning of life in this place as we continue equipping all people to live out Christ's love.

#### UPDATE FROM PASTOR LAUREN

Thank you, dear people of Muhlenberg, for your prayers this past week! On Friday night (May 12) while attending my son's baseball game, I was hit in the head by a wild pitch as some kids were warming up behind the spectators. I lost consciousness and was taken to the hospital. Thankfully the CT scan came back clear, and I was diagnosed with a concussion. After lots of rest, my concussion symptoms have significantly improved.

Unfortunately, the other thing that happened during this event was that my heart paused multiple times (one time for 18 seconds!) The cardiologist has been monitoring my heart closely and once this was observed, it became clear that I need a pacemaker, as this is not the first time we've observed significant pauses in my heart.

I will be having the pacemaker installed this Thursday, May 25 in Charlottesville. I anticipate only being out of work for a couple of days, and then returning to Muhlenberg with a strong heart and renewed mind!

Thank you for your ongoing prayers--they mean the world to me and my family.

### **CREATION CARE**

If you have a garden, you probably have weeds. Pulling them by hand is more work, but much more environmentally



friendly than using harsh chemicals. A hand trowel or small hoe might make the job easier. Pull weeds when the ground is moist and spread a thin layer of mulch to shade the surface of the garden and prevent weeds from germinating. Be sure to add the weeds to your compost pile.

### WHERE IS SHUKULU? **An RLS Alumni Story**

Did you know that Muhlenberg has sponsored several students in Rwanda through the Rwanda School Project?

The very first student sponsored Muhlenberg is Shukulu, who was in the first graduating class at the Rwamagana Leader's School (RLS). She was accepted after her mother came to the school and asked if her daughter could attend. They had experienced the genocide and her mother did not have the money to pay tuition but hoped that a scholarship might be available. She even offered to work at the school cooking and cleaning to help pay for Shukulu's fee. That's when the Rwanda School Project asked Muhlenberg to sponsor her, and we did so for her entire upper level education at RLS.

We have watched this young girl grow in so many ways and she is now not only a proud graduate of the school but has continued her education through scholarships from the Rwanda education program. Here is her progress report in her own words:

"I graduated from Rwamagana Leader's School in 2015. A big part of who I am today is because of the foundation I got there. RLS helped me acquire advanced academic knowledge as well as social skills.

Currently, I am studying in Japan. I am planning to continue for doctoral studies. RLS helped me have hope for my future. Based on the strong academic background I got from RLS, I had a chance to work with people from different countries in the field of peacebuilding and development. In 2019, I worked in Ethiopia, and I am an international facilitator in the program called Alternative to Violence Program. Currently, I am studying for a Master's in Peace and Conflict Studies in Japan. I will graduate in September. I believe that God will bless me so that I can achieve this goal. RLS also activates young people to be agents of social change in the world. I am among those people."

Muhlenberg has sponsored three other students: one who has also graduated (update coming soon), one who will graduate this year and Patrick, who will continue next year. We thank all those who have contributed to their success and welcome new donors to continue helping future students.

### MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH AT MUHLENBERG

May is Mental Health Awareness Month, established in 1949 to increase awareness of the importance of mental health and wellness in Americans' lives, and to celebrate recovery from mental illness. This is a time for raising awareness and understanding about mental health, and we hope to do that here with a particular lens toward the role of faith in responding to mental health care needs. I know from personal experience the value of destignatizing conversations around mental health, both for my own well-being and the well-being of others, and I hope that as we prioritize mental health at Muhlenberg, we can foster a supportive community for all.

Mental Health Awareness Month serves as a vital reminder that mental health is a fundamental aspect of our overall well-being, and grants us an opportunity to engage in open conversations, challenge stigmas, and extend compassion to those living with mental illness. Historically, the church as a whole has not always gotten this right, often attributing mental health crises to a sinful origin, or labeling them as a moral failing. It's time to do our part to #StopTheStigma and cultivate a community of welcome where mental health concerns are met with compassion and not judgement. If you or a loved one is struggling with your mental health, please know that you are not alone, and your pastors are always willing to talk with you. Your health and your life matter.

At Muhlenberg, we recognize the importance of nurturing an inclusive environment where everyone feels accepted and supported. To further our understanding of mental health, we invite you to explore the ELCA's comprehensive <u>Social Message on Mental Health</u>. This enlightening document delves into the church's perspective on mental health, addressing topics such as the historical exclusion of individuals with mental illness and the significance of healing and companionship. Also, information will be shared on Social Media through videos and posts about the crossroads of mental health and faith. As your Pastor, I will strive to bring my own authenticity and vulnerability to these conversations as a means of inviting further dialogue. Feel free to share these resources and start a conversation within your own circles. Let me know directly if you are interested in beginning a community study around the ELCA Social Message.

During this month, and always, let us strive to create a community that embraces mental health and well-being. Engage in meaningful discussions, listen with empathy, and offer support to those who may be facing mental health challenges. Remember, even small acts of kindness and understanding can have a profound impact on someone's journey toward healing. Together, we can foster an environment that promotes mental well-being and ensures that no one feels alone in their struggles. Together we can realize a future where mental health is prioritized and destignatized.

### FAITHFUL PEOPLE, FAITHFUL QUESTIONS

# "How will I know my loved one is still with me after their physical body is gone? What signs can I look for?"



Losing a loved one is a deeply challenging experience. As we see when Jesus weeps at the tomb of Lazarus, death is a separation that truly grieves the heart of God. At the same time it's natural to wonder how we can continue to feel the presence of our loved ones once their physical body is gone. Our Lutheran theology calls us to name and claim the finality of death, the hard separation, and the pain of this grief. At the same time, we bear the hope of the resurrection, and somehow see a glimpse of resurrection life for ourselves and

our loved ones here and now. Christ meets us in that mysterious intersection of life. The reality is, while death brings the finality of physical separation, the impact of our loved ones can endure in beautiful and profound ways.

In the face of this mystery, we find solace in the power of love and the memories we cherish. Our Jewish neighbors express a beautiful sentiment for the dead, saying, "May their memory be a blessing." The influence our loved ones had on our lives continues to resonate within us, shaping our thoughts, actions, and values. Their love becomes a part of who we are, and in that sense, they live on through us in blessed memory. This understanding of blessed memory still honors the painful separation of death, while giving space for the endurance of love.

Scripture offers comfort in assuring us that love transcends the boundaries of physical existence. 1 Corinthians 13:8 says, "Love never ends." Love is an eternal force that persists beyond our mortal lives. While we may not see or hear our loved ones as we did before, their love endures, strengthening our bonds and providing comfort in times of need.

Embracing the mystery of blessed memory allows us to honor our loved ones and at the same time honor the reality of this painful separation of death through our grief. Through sharing stories, engaging in traditions they held dear, and living out the values they instilled in us, we perpetuate their legacy. As we carry their love within our hearts, they remain present in our lives.

While we may long for tangible signs of their presence, it is through the intangible realm of memory, love, and shared experiences that we connect with our departed loved ones. In the depths of our hearts, we can find reassurance that their love continues to guide and inspire us, offering a source of comfort and strength. In the journey of grief, we acknowledge the finality of death—earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust—yet we also embrace the enduring power of love. May we find solace in the cherished memories and the lasting impact our loved ones have left behind, knowing that through love and Christ's resurrection, they remain forever connected to us.

# After seeing us use 'High Voices and Low Voices' on Palm Sunday, a member said, "I appreciated that! Could we use more inclusive language like 'Siblings in Christ' instead of 'Brothers and Sisters' in worship?"

Absolutely! Language has a powerful impact on our sense of belonging and inclusivity. We have been striving to ensure that our language in worship reflects a diverse understanding of God and God's people for some time now. While the phrase 'brothers and sisters' has been traditionally used in worship, it's important to recognize that language evolves over time to reflect a more inclusive understanding of our diverse congregation.

Just a few decades ago, it was common to exclusively use the terms 'brothers, man, or mankind' when referring to the entire congregation or humanity. However, the introduction of 'brothers and sisters' marked an important step towards inclusivity, acknowledging the presence and contributions of all women within the community of faith who were left out by that language.

Expanding our language to more frequently use terms like 'Siblings in Christ, Friends, and Beloved Community' continues this journey of inclusivity. By doing so, we actively join God in the work of sharing an ever-widening circle of grace, embracing and affirming the diverse identities and experiences of all people. It sends a powerful message that everyone, regardless of their gender identity or expression, has a valued and welcome place in God's family.

We will continue to use words like 'Father' in our creeds and the Lord's Prayer, but don't be surprised to hear prayers that call upon the "Mothering love" of our God like Jesus described in Luke 13:31-35, or intercede to the Spirit as a feminine embodiment of wisdom, as seen in the Hebrew Scriptures. These diverse images allow us to see and hear the wideness of God's presence in biblically grounded ways.

When we are intentional about embodying God's radical hospitality and embracing the diversity of God's creation, our worship is a celebration of the richness of our shared language that reflects the beauty and inclusivity of our congregation. We'll continue striving to create a worship experience where everyone feels seen, heard, and valued as beloved Siblings in Christ.

### VBS IS JUST ON THE HORIZON

**August 7 - 11**(in the evenings)

VBS is a great opportunity to focus on Jesus and community. Our theme is *Compassion Camp: What Every Living Thing Needs*. Participants will explore what all living things need to live—*shelter, food, water, air, and community*—and how we can have compassion for the living earth, especially in their local ecosystems.
